## Tools for Teachers Lesson Plans

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| Skills: Gross Motor Movement/Auditory Response | Activity: Physical/Auditory/Musical |

## Primary Intelligence Mode: Body/Kinesthetic Movement

## Secondary Intelligence Modes:

- Musical/Rhythmic - Sensitivity to Beat and Changing Tempo
- Verbal/Linguistic - Language Development
- Visual/Spatial - Mental Image/Visualization and Imagination


## Music Appreciation: Light Pop March

- Instrumentation: Acoustic Guitar, Bass, Drums, Synthesizer Effects for Animal Characters
- Move to the strong beat of the $4 / 4$ time of the march.
- Note the change from duple to triple meter with "fly like a bird."
- Change tempos and mood with each animal movement.

Classroom Preparation:

- If classroom space permits, line up in single file and march or move like the different animals around the room.
- Otherwise, march and move in place.
- Have rhythm instruments handy to play the steady march beat.


## Lesson Plan

Gross Motor Activity: To use as a rainy day indoor gross motor activity, encourage the children to join the animal parade.

- March with the animals - steady marching beat
- Jump like a monkey - bouncing rhythm, jumping, hanging by the tail
- Crawl like a turtle - slow tempo, lumbering crawl on the floor
- Fly like a bird - light flight with arms spread wide, quick tempo
- Hop like a bunny - bouncing rhythm, hopping on two feet, then one foot


## Literacy Activities: Read animal books including non-fiction science trade books.

- Make connections with science and discuss how animals move in their natural environment.
- Use animal puppets to demonstrate and dramatize movements.

Art Activities: Draw or paint the animals on parade

- Create animal art individually or paint a group mural.
- Make animal puppets.

Musical Activities: Beat, Rhythm, Melody, and Movement

- Vary the tempo and timbre for the different animals in the parade.
- Discuss the characteristics of the synthesizer melodies: highs and lows in the monkey jumps and bunny hops, bouncy rhythms, the high fluid flight of the bird, the slow, low, lumbering movements of the turtle crawl, etc.
